Report of the Management Committee (Directors' Report) For the Year Ended 31 March 2013

The members of the Management Committee (who are the directors of the company) are pleased to present their report and the financial statements for the year to 31st March 2013.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Welcoming Association, also known as "The Welcoming" is a company limited by guarantee, with the liability of members limited to £1 each. The company is governed by the terms of its Articles of Association and is a registered Scottish charity.

Members of the Management Committee are elected from the membership at the Annual General Meeting, or at any time by the Committee. At each Annual General Meeting, all of the Management Committee members retire from office but are eligible for re-election.

The names of those who served as members of the Management Committee during the year are shown on page 2.

Objectives and Review of Activities

The Charity's objects as stated in the Articles of Association are:

- (1) The advancement of education
- (2) The advancement of citizenship or community development
- (3) The promotion of religious or racial harmony

The Welcoming works to manage and integrate the increasing flow of migrants that are arriving in Edinburgh through it's 'Scotland for Newcomers' programme; originally the 'Edinburgh Migrants Employability Programme'.

It provides an all-year round open-access, drop-in and free service to migrants and refugees wishing to improve their employability, to gain English language skills, to develop their knowledge of Scottish culture and heritage and to gain independence and self-sufficiency in order to enhance their social integration with the Scottish communities living in Edinburgh.

During the period April 1st 2012 to 31st March 2013 the Welcoming Association registered 835 migrants onto its programme from 57 different nationalities. The 'Scotland for Newcomers' programme averaged 185 people per week over a 44 week programme. A further 563 people attended a range of cultural celebrations and social events, as part of the social integration and befriending process, and socialised and networked with local Scottish and minority ethnic communities and organisations. A total of 1,398 users attended Welcoming events for that year. There were 20 new enquiries per week for places in the Welcoming's 9 English classes and 4 capacity-building programmes. All of the English intermediate classes were regularly over-subscribed with up to 15+ students turned away daily.

The programme enabled 65 users to satisfactorily pass the Welcoming's equivalent to the Cambridge First Certificate examination, at English intermediate level. It enrolled 90 users onto it's employability programme with 17 users finding paid employment. The volunteering programme had 25 users gaining UK work experience in a range of opportunities including becoming members of the Welcoming's management committee, administration support, catering, art tutoring, event promotions, English language teaching, sound engineering, health and wellbeing, cultural learning and cinema club workshop facilitating. In total, a combined number of 660 users enrolled and regularly attended the Welcoming's beginners, elementary and intermediate English language programmes for that period.

Plans for 2013/2014:

To find larger city-centre premises for a seven-day-per-week service to accommodate the large increase in numbers of students needing Beginners, Elementary and Intermediate English classes and social integration and capacity building activities.

To further develop partnerships with the Volunteer Centre Edinburgh and Linknet Mentoring to provide volunteering and mentoring opportunities, respectively, to Welcoming users.

To work with the City of Edinburgh Council ESOL providers network to develop systems of quality assurance and good practices in ESOL teaching.

To further develop the work of the Edinburgh Migrant Forum with the aims to involve refugee and migrant communities, on a political level, on local strategies and policies that impact upon the health and wellbeing of these communities living in Edinburgh.

Financial Review

Income for the year was £63,071 and expenditure £70,871 giving a deficit for the year of £7,800, which was funded by reserves brought forward from the previous year. A full breakdown is given on the Statement of Financial Activities on page 7.

Unrestricted reserves, which represent those funds that are readily available to the charity, stood at the year end at £2,038. The Management Committee considers that the charity should have reserves of approximately three months running costs and they are looking into how this can be achieved.

Independent Examiner's report to the Members of the Management Committee of The Welcoming Association

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2013 which are set out on pages 6 to 10.

Respective responsibilities of management committee and examiner

The charity's management committee is responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

The management committee considers that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the Management Committee concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Independent examiner's statement

Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2008) and the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities, issued in March 2005.

Grants and donations

Income from annual grants is recognised in the period to which the grant relates. Any annual grants received in advance are included as deferred grants in creditors. Income from other grants and donations is recognised on receipt.

Where a grant or donation is received for a specific purpose, it is included in restricted income and any unexpended portion carried forward as a restricted fund.

Taxation

The company is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

The company is not registered for VAT and expenditure includes VAT where relevant.

Fund Accounting

Restricted funds may only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the charity as specified by the donor or by the terms of an application for the funds.

Designated funds are set aside by the Trustees out of unrestricted funds for specific purposes or projects.

The *Unrestricted general fund* is available to be used for any of the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees.
