Report of the Management Committee (Directors' Report) For the Year Ended 31 March 2015

The members of the Management Committee (who are the directors of the company) are pleased to present their report and the financial statements for the year to 31st March 2015.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Welcoming Association, also known as "The Welcoming" is a company limited by guarantee, with the liability of members limited to £1 each. The company is governed by the terms of its Articles of Association and is a registered Scottish charity.

Members of the Management Committee are elected from the membership at the Annual General Meeting, or at any time by the Committee. At each Annual General Meeting, all of the Management Committee members retire from office but are eligible for re-election.

The names of those who served as members of the Management Committee during the year are shown on page 2.

Objectives and Review of Activities

The Charity's objects as stated in the Articles of Association are:

- (1) The advancement of education
- (2) The advancement of citizenship or community development
- (3) The promotion of religious or racial harmony

The Mission Statement 2015 to 2020

The Welcoming works to identify and engage with the migrants and refugees that are moving to the City of Edinburgh to ensure that they are provided with access and opportunity to:

- Easily accessible and up to date information on local support services available to them.
- High quality and affordable English lessons that allow them to develop their English language skills to a point where lack of English language ability no longer acts as a barrier to employment, education or integration.
- Opportunities to gain a better understanding of their new home through learning about and experiencing Scotland's music, food, history and culture.
- Employability training that allows them to effectively present their skills to potential employers, increasing the likelihood of securing a job which makes the most of their talents.
- Opportunities to meet and develop connections with other foreign nationals in a similar position in order to build their social and support networks.
- Volunteering and work experience opportunities in ESOL teaching, community development, migrant research, and tackling climate change projects in the community,
- Training and advice to make behavioural changes to use more efficient technologies to reduce their carbon emissions and to educate other migrant communities in energy saving.

The Migrant and Refugee Living and Working in Scotland 2014 to 2015 programme

This programme has provided an all-year round (48 week) open-access, drop-in and free service to migrants and refugees that have needed to improve their employability, to gain English language skills, to develop their knowledge of Scottish culture and heritage and to gain independence and self-sufficiency in order to enhance their social integration with the Scottish communities living in Edinburgh.

Report of the Management Committee For the Year Ended 31 March 2015

During the period from April 1st 2014 to 31st March 2015 the Welcoming Association ran a total of 15 weekly English classes covering; beginners, elementary, lower, upper intermediate and conversational English and a range of all-year round programmes covering; employability advice and guidance, creative art, volunteering, anti-sectarianism, cultural learning and social integration.

Programme Outcomes for 2014 to 2015

The Welcoming registered 1,062 migrants onto its programme from over 55 different nationalities and the average attendance is 13 classes per person per year (With the highest individual's attendance being 132 classes over the year and the lowest just one class). Participants usually engage with The Welcoming for an average of 3 months before moving on to paid work, volunteering, higher education or going back to their country of origin.

The Migrant and Refugee Living and Working in Scotland programme averaged 253 people per week over a 48 week, Monday to Friday programme. 240 people attended a range of cultural celebrations, as part of the social integration and befriending process, and socialised and networked with local Scottish and minority ethnic communities and organisations. There were around 20 new enquiries per week for places in the Welcoming's 12 English classes and 4 capacity-building social integration programme's weekly activities. All of the English intermediate classes were regularly over-subscribed with up to 5+ students turned away daily.

The programme enabled 42 users to satisfactorily pass the Welcoming's equivalent to the Cambridge First Certificate examination, at English intermediate level. 195 users were assisted to progress through the Welcoming's employability programme to secure full-time, part-time or sessional paid employment.

The volunteering programme had 15 users gaining UK work experience in a range of opportunities including becoming members of the Welcoming's management committee, administration support, catering, art tutoring, event promotions, sound engineering, health and wellbeing, cultural learning and cinema club workshop facilitating. In addition, the Welcoming also recruited and enabled 25 qualified volunteer ESOL teachers to gain teaching experience and assist the organisation in delivering its extensive English language programmes.

Further achievements for the financial year from April 2014 to March 2015.

New Premises

The Welcoming Association moved to new premises, owned by the Dunedin and Canmore Group, in Westfield Avenue, Edinburgh EH11 in late December 2014 and started its new Spring Programme on Monday 5th January 2015. Acknowledgement and thanks to the Dunedin & Canmore Group for their support of the Welcoming by kindly offering a rent reduction for the first six months let whilst it secured core grant funding.

2. Grant Funding

The welcoming Association received core funding from the City of Edinburgh Council, the Scottish Government and The Robertson Trust. Project funding was also received from various sources. Further details can be found on page 10.

Funding has also been secured for the 2015-16 year:

- The Keep Scotland Beautiful 'Climate Challenge Fund' awarded the Welcoming £145,613.00 to deliver a tackling climate change programme for 2015/2016.
 Acknowledgement and thanks is given to CEMVO Glasgow who gave the Welcoming ongoing time and support and encouragement throughout the grant application stages to enable the Welcoming to successfully secure this grant award.
- The City of Edinburgh Council's 'Reducing Health Inequalities' programme awarded the Welcoming £4,960 to develop its Skills for Living and Working in Scotland' programme 2015/2016.

 The Tudor Trust awarded the Welcoming £36,000 to develop its Migrant and Refugee Living and Working in Scotland programme for 2015/2016.

3. Support in kind

- St. John's Church, Princes Street, Edinburgh supported and generously waived all its hall rental charges over the past year to enable the Welcoming to run its English for Employability programme and Welcoming A Greener Future events free of charge.
- The Kaplan English Language School very kindly donated over 650 English language course books and packs to the Welcoming in February 2015.
- The Bright Green Initiative donated re-cycled office furniture to enable the Welcoming to furnish its office floor and classroom.
- The City of Edinburgh Council donated office furniture.
- The Forest Centre Plus had supported and enabled the Welcoming to deliver its full programme of activities by providing affordable rent of its premises and facilities.

4. Projects

- The Welcoming sponsored and worked with the Spanish 'K314 Theatre Company' to
 enable them present their latest production 'Kitchen Porters' at the Just Festival at St.
 John's Church during the Edinburgh Fringe festival 2014. The company recruited and
 trained Welcoming participants as actors and technicians for this production.
- The Welcoming worked with the newly independent 'Art Escape' project to stage its first migrant and Scottish women's public art exhibition at St. John's Church in July 2014.

Financial Review

Income for the year was £76,541, a decrease of around 25% on the previous year and expenditure was £90,337 giving a deficit for the year of £13,796, mainly due to restricted funds carried forward spent in this year. A full breakdown of the income and expenditure is given on the Statement of Financial Activities on page 8.

The balance of general funds (see page 11) was in deficit by £1,754 at the year end, however the Association has been successful in securing new funding for 2015/16 as detailed above, which will cover this amount. The Management Committee considers that the charity should have reserves of approximately three months running costs and they are looking into how this can be achieved.

Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2008) and the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities, issued in March 2005.

Grants and donations

Income from annual grants is recognised in the period to which the grant relates. Any annual grants received in advance are included as deferred grants in creditors. Income from other grants and donations is recognised on receipt.

Where a grant or donation is received for a specific purpose, it is included in restricted income and any unexpended portion carried forward as a restricted fund.

Gifts in kind and donated services and facilities are included in the Statement of Financial Activities based on a reasonable estimate of the amount the charity would have to pay in the open market for an equivalent item, service or facility.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes VAT which cannot be recovered and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities for its beneficiaries.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the independent examiner's fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

Tangible fixed assets

Equipment costing £500 or more is included in the Balance Sheet under tangible fixed assets and is stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is calculated by the straight line method to write off the cost of fixed assets over their estimated useful lives at the following rates:

20% per annum

Taxation

The company is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

The company is not registered for VAT and expenditure includes VAT where relevant.

Fund Accounting

Restricted funds may only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the charity as specified by the donor or by the terms of an application for the funds.

Designated funds are set aside by the Trustees out of unrestricted funds for specific purposes or projects.

The *Unrestricted general fund* is available to be used for any of the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees.
